









REFLECTIONS ON CUBA

Looking out of my plane window, I saw only water all around, when suddenly, a small island appeared. Cuba! Drier and flatter than I anticipated, little


did I know it would soon feel like home. Greeted at the airport by Pastor Dorilin, an exuberant young woman with boundless enthusiasm, we then climbed into a painted school bus which reminded me of trips I have made to Ghana. We arrived at Bautista Iglesia William Carey in downtown Havana. After our bags



were carried inside, we were fed guava-pineapple juice and sandwiches before going to our second floor dorm rooms. We were greeted with kisses and hugs from the entire church body; this hospitality continued our entire visit.

Saturday morning I went with Ellen to visit Minerva, the head of the missions program. Minerva's conversation was eager, impassioned and directed at welcoming us and establishing a lasting bond. Her words were "We are sisters in Christ". I found myself awed by her graciousness and conviction.

All conversation was made possible by our diligent and delightful 22-year-old translator, Esther, who had just completed a degree in economics. A few phrases I mastered, however, came in handy: "Lo siento" (I'm sorry), I said this more often than I would like to admit for various faux pas; and. "Donde esta el bano?" (Where is the bathroom) received cheers from a group







Goodwill and warmth characterized all of my experiences with the church. These included a meeting with the church elders, Sunday School taught by a well-studied teacher and active class

participation, a 2+ hour church service

with singing and greeting that expressed their love for God, for each other and for us, and an afternoon meeting with key members of the church. I was stirred by the spirit present in this



congregation which clearly opens its arms to their community and supports numerous programs like AA/NA whose nightly meetings were held in the church courtyard and were well attended. The singing of the congregation was especially moving. The sincerity and belief expressed in their faces and conveyed in their voices made me feel near to the heart of God.

In addition to the liveliness of our experiences with fellow Baptists, we had opportunities to see a riveting modern dance performance, to have a guided tour of Havana and to visit the Museum of Fine Arts and the Museum of the Revolution. It was an incredible 6 days and I will always be grateful for it and for the goodness of being with my fellow First Baptist Church friends.

On January 22 and 28, fifty congregation members participated in small-group discussions on Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) inclusiveness-specifically regarding marriage and baby dedications—and how the church might discern this issue moving forward. On Sunday, March 19, following the worship service, the Inclusion Team will hold an additional small-group discussion session for those who were unable to participate in the January groups. On Sunday, March 19, following the worship service, participants should meet downstairs in Fellowship Hall. A snack will be provided. The group will address the following discussion prompts:

- 1. First Baptist Church already welcomes as members—including many who are serving in leadership roles—Christians who identify as members of the LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender) communities. How do you feel about guaranteeing to all members, without exception, the ability to participate in all of the blessings and benefits of membership, including marriage and parent and child dedications?
- 2. What process would you like to see the congregation use as we discern this issue? Would it involve a congregational vote on a new inclusion policy or a change to an existing policy? Would it involve some sort of consensus conclusion about policy that did not rely on a vote? Would it involve further discussion, Bible study, or topical study of the issue? Or would the ideal process you envision for discerning this issue look like something else altogether?
