

The German theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer is invoked in conversations across the political spectrum—from issues of abortion and euthanasia to pacifism and racial justice. He served as a pastor and seminary teacher during the Third Reich and was executed in a concentration camp for his role in a plot to assassinate Hitler. But mostly, Bonhoeffer was committed to the mission of the church. This session will draw on his work and life to explore the relationship between church and politics in our contemporary time.

INCLUSION: A REPORT ON SUNDAY'S CALL FOR DISCERNMENT

On Sunday, September 24, FBCDC's members capped a years-long journey of prayer, Scripture study and smallgroup discussions, and expressed their discernment regarding the inclusion and involvement of persons who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT). A majority affirmed LGBT members' "full participation in the life of our

community," to include "being fully eligible to participate in the ordinances, blessings, benefits and responsibilities of church membership--including communion, baptism, marriage, ordination, parent/child dedications, and all offices and positions of leadership."

I would like to thank everyone who joined us on this journey of discernment, as well as my fellow Deacons, members of the Inclusion Team, and our Pastoral Staff, for their wisdom and prayerful consideration.

After distributing recommendations for inclusion in a report (https://goo.gl/uegNXb), the Deacons, Inclusion Team and Pastoral Staff asked members to privately and anonymously mark discernment statements. The statements were collected and tallied, and the following results were shared:

- 51 members marked the first response, indicating the statements accurately reflect God's leading in our church at this time;
- 3 members marked the second response, indicating the statements do not accurately reflect God's leading in our church at this time, but that they are willing to remain a part of this body, if the statements are affirmed by the congregation;
- 11 members marked the third response, indicating the statements do not accurately reflect God's leading in our church at this time.



I want to emphasize this portion of the discernment statement: "Any individual member's 'full participation in the life of our community,' does not bind any other individual member's conscience on an issue about which they may differ, but rather requires honest commitment to life together in the community of Christ regardless of differences." This underscores the beauty of our diversity at FBCDC, and the freedom we all share to discern matters of faith for ourselves. Each and every person in our congregation is immeasurably valued and beloved, and it has been the overarching goal of the Deacons, Inclusion Team and Pastoral Staff to highlight this throughout the discernment journey.



A Pastoral Reflection: Pastor Julie

In Matthew, Mark and Luke, Jesus says, "Two things matter most for my followers. I want you to have a loving relationship with God. And I want you to have a loving relationship with the people around you."

When I was growing up in church, those words of Jesus didn't get all that much air time. Based on what the preacher and everybody else around me was saying, I might

have assumed that the answer to the question, What's the greatest commandment? was:

Behave vourself.

Clean up your act.

Do better.

Shape up.

Shun sinners.

But apparently, that's not the first thing on Jesus' mind. The most important thing, according to him, is loving God, and loving other people.

Last Sunday our church took a significant step together. In truth, not all that much is different today than it was last week. This is because, over time, the Spirit has been patiently at work at First Baptist, widening our borders; wedging us open; enlarging our embrace. On Sunday, we heartily affirmed together that being open and inclusive of all people, without exception, is part of the essential character of our community of faith.

The journey we made together during the Inclusion process was good and necessary. Now let's fling open our doors and stream out to greet our neighbors—all of them—with the astonishing, all-encompassing love of God.

WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY **THIS WEEK**

World Communion Sunday is an event that bridges denominations and emphasizes our commonality in the body of Christ. Begun in 1936 in the Presbyterian Church, World Communion Sunday has grown into an international ecumenical celebration of Christian unity. When we celebrate the Lord's Supper, we attempt to focus more on Christ's marvelous work of grace than on our power to fix or transform ourselves. And on World Communion Sunday believers around the globe remember that which we hold in common rather than our differences.





You may be wondering, "Who in the world are The CenturyMen?" Well, let me tell you. The CenturyMen is a group of music ministers from across the country who gather together once a year for a concert tour or a recording project. They are professional musicians with graduate degrees in music who audition to be a part of the group. They were one of the first groups to gain entrance to China back in the late 70's and have performed literally around the world. They once performed for the Dove Awards and in April 2016 they performed across the island of Cuba building relationships with the churches and church musicians there.

Their accompanist is Joseph Joubert. Joseph plays for numerous projects across New York including Broadway and television as well as traveling across the country as a guest soloist with various orchestras. He has been music director, conductor, and orchestrator for various Broadway musicals including, "Motown the Musical" and "The Color Purple." On this year's tour, Joseph plays a pre-concert of selections from his newest recording.

Their guest soloist is the accomplished lyric soprano, Renee Joubert, who specializes in a variety of musical styles. Their organist is our own Cindy Fuller.

This is quite an accomplished group of musicians. And I get to be their music director and conductor.



If the shapes of hospitality are as diverse as the needs among us, I wonder how we should practice this hospitality in light of our faith?

Admittedly, I am more comfortable asking questions than I am giving answers. So, can we ponder this question together?

How can we feed our neighbors with the faithfulness that God has demonstrated? How can we make room in our church for the unique gifts and needs of our neighbors who have yet to walk through the doors? Will you wonder with me?

RECAP OF NEW BAPTIST COVENANT

Last week, I attended the New Baptist Covenant Summit in Atlanta, GA. It was good to see old friends and meet new ones as we discussed the future of The Church. The theme was ART- Action, Reconciliation, and Transformation.

Together we shared about the diverse ways we are called to be church in our contexts and the issues that arise in our communities.

In 2007, President Carter brought together prominent leaders from across the Baptist family. These leaders represented more than 30 Baptist organizations and over 20 million people. He challenged them to explore new



opportunities for fellowship and cooperation. From this effort, a ministry of action named the New Baptist Covenant was born, uniting Baptists and renewing our pursuit of unity and justice on the local and national scale. Since 2007, Baptist churches across the country have partnered to engage their local communities to advocate and engage in reconciliation work. ~Pastor Alyssa

In the coming months, Pastor Julie and I will discuss with the New Baptist Covenant what a partnership might look like for us and a local historically black Baptist church in town. We look forward to these future talks and relationships.
