

All the major themes of a believer's story are visible every time we baptize: birth, cleansing, new "clothes", community, burial, resurrection. Join us as we remember our story.

PREACHING AT FBC

February 4 - BTSR Professor Tracy Hartman Preaching

This Sunday, February 4, our guest proclaimer in worship is Dr. Tracy Hartman, professor of preaching, spiritual formation and practical theology at Baptist Theological Seminary at Richmond, where she also serves as Acting Vice President of Academic Affairs. She is a life coach and preaches frequently in churches throughout the region. She earned her academic degrees from Carson-Newman University (BA), BTSR (MDiv) and Union Theological Seminary and Presbyterian School of Christian Education (PhD). In a recent interview, Dr. Hartman said, "I love my calling. No two days are ever the same! I also love the constant interaction I have with both the academy and the church." (Pastor Julie is leading a weekend retreat and preaching in worship this Sunday at Second Baptist Church in Little Rock, AR, where Charlie and Cindy Fuller served before coming to FBCDC.)

February 11: Charlie Fuller Preaching

FBC Executive Pastor, Charlie Fuller, brings the message in worship on February 11. Charlie spent much of his "first" working life as a teacher and professor of music at high schools and universities in Arkansas, Texas and Arizona, and served for three years as Dean of the School of Fine Arts at Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, AR. In addition to three academic degrees in music, Charlie earned an M.Div. from Baylor's Truett Baptist Theological Seminary (2010) and a D.Min. from BTSR (2015). Charlie and Cindy began their pilgrimage with FBC on New Year's Day, 2017. For the past 18 months, Charlie has served as chair of the Illumination Project Committee for Cooperative Baptist Fellowship. The committee was tasked in June of 2016 with exploring how Cooperative Baptists can strengthen their unity in the face of different beliefs and practices in matters of human sexuality. (Pastor Julie is preaching February 11 at Calvary Baptist Church in Waco, TX, for the installation of their new pastor, Mary Alice Birdwhistell. The P-Rs were at Calvary from 1998-2007.)




Wednesdays @7pm February 21 - March 21 FBC Sanctuary

CASCARONES? SAVE YOUR EGG SHELLS

Last year it was a treat to see our church folk participate in the wonderful tradition of cracking cascarones on the heads of friends and family. And now that we've done it one year, I look forward to this year's bounty of egg shells! Just in case you don't know what a cascarone is- a cascarone is a hollowed out chicken egg decorated, filled with

confetti, and topped with a piece of tissue paper. On Easter Sunday, one -with the best intentions of course- cracks a cascarone on a friend's head, signifying colorful showers of God's grace and blessings. Cascarones are a Mexican Easter tradition dating back to the mid-1800s and used mostly in towns on the Mexico/Texas border. During the 40 days of Lent, I'd like to invite you to save your washed eggshells and drop them off with me, Alyssa Aldape. The week before Easter, the youth will gather to put together cascarones to share with our church family on Easter Sunday!





CONCENTRIC **CIRCLES OF PEACE: MEDITATING ON** THE FINE ART **OF CONFLICT TRANSFORMATION**

New 6-week Sunday Morning Class During Lent (begins Feb. 18)

You are warmly invited to join our Lenten adult devotional hour, from 9:30-10:30am on Sunday mornings over the course of *six Sundays, to reflect and prepare for a collective, spiritual journey. Taking some poignant cues from a handful of inspiring peacemakers including the notable German pastor, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, we will pause each Sunday during Lent to allow for four "moments."

Each week we will listen for four distinct "P's" of spiritual formation:

- a spiritual **practice**
- a transformative process
- a devotional prayer, and
- a poetic word from the prayer book of the Bible, the Psalms

We will begin each class with a brief, intentional time for group members to share with one another. We shall conclude each class with a moment for live, gentle, meditational music to help us along our way. This class in spiritual formation hopes to reflect God's light in such a way that God's beauty might be seen more clearly and felt more dearly.

Each week we will look and listen for the work of peace in three concentric circles:

1st Circle: The spiritual communion/relationship between the individual and the present Christ. 2nd Circle: The spiritual relationship or communion between two or more persons, interpersonally. 3rd Circle: Ways in which the even wider concentric circle of the peace of Christ is taking shape out in

the local/global fields.

We hope you'll join us in this guiet, inward Lenten journey and see where it might lead!

A group for all ages that practices the Christian spiritual discipline of contemplative prayer using the Centering Prayer method. Prayer is followed by discussion of a book dealing with prayer or other spiritual practices. 
9am **Breakfast in Fellowship Hall** (free; catered by Chef Laval)

UPCOMING BENEVOLENCE OFFERING TO GO TO **HURRICANE SURVIVORS WITH FBC TIES**

Our monthly Benevolence Offering to be collected after Communion this Sunday, February 4th, will be specially designated to the families of two of our sisters-in-Christ: Carolyn B-Roebuck, Director of FBC's Child Development Center, has family in Puerto Rico as well as the US Virgin Islands. And one of our choir members, Anamer Castrello, is from Puerto Rico. Our congregation is pitching in to help these families who still need basic items four months after the hurricanes hit.

Anamer's mother, brother and his wife and two children are still without hot water in their home in Guaynabo. The family went without electricity for 87 days, finally getting power on December 12, but their water heater failed to work after power was restored. They want to buy a solar powered/electric back-up hot water heater. Cost: \$556.

Carolyn's family is not only in Puerto Rico but also St. Croix and St. Thomas. Some have had power restored and some are still waiting. Their primary need is generators. Cost: around \$500 each. Another need is batteries (sizes AA, C and D) for the flashlights and lanterns they have.

Boxes are located near church entrances to collect new batteries that you wish to donate; monetary contributions should be designated as "Hurricane Relief." Thank you for your generosity!

REPORT FROM NEW ORLEANS

Liturgy. Laughter. Prayer. Poetry. Theology. Justice. Jambalaya. Tim and I experienced these gifts and more last week in New Orleans at a pastor's retreat associated with the Convergence Leadership Project (associated with the Center for Progressive Renewal). For four days we talked, pondered and prayed with a circle of eleven other pastors in a Sunday School classroom at St. Charles Avenue Baptist Church (an Alliance of Baptists congregation led by Elizabeth Mangham Lott). Our leaders were Brian McLaren, pastor, author and advocate; and Jacqui Lewis, senior pastor of Middle Collegiate Church in Manhattan.

I almost didn't go. With a couple of speaking commitments coming up, and after some holiday travel and our family funeral in Texas, I wasn't sure I could afford the time. I'm so very glad I went. Our conversations last week about everything from liturgy to money to spiritual formation to community organizing, as well as new friendships formed during the week, inspired a fresh wave of energy and enthusiasm in me for the days and months ahead.

Thank you, First Baptist family, for investing in Convergence Leadership Project this year, and for the gift of time to participate in several CLP events over a 12-month period. Four FBC members volunteered early in 2017 to be part of the CLP journey: Kate

Campbell, Chelsea Clarke, Allen Norfleet and Lucy Plovnick, with Alyssa Aldape and me as staff liaisons. Four of us traveled to NYC last August for a symposium at Middle Collegiate; the next conference takes place April 6-8, also at Middle Collegiate Church.


